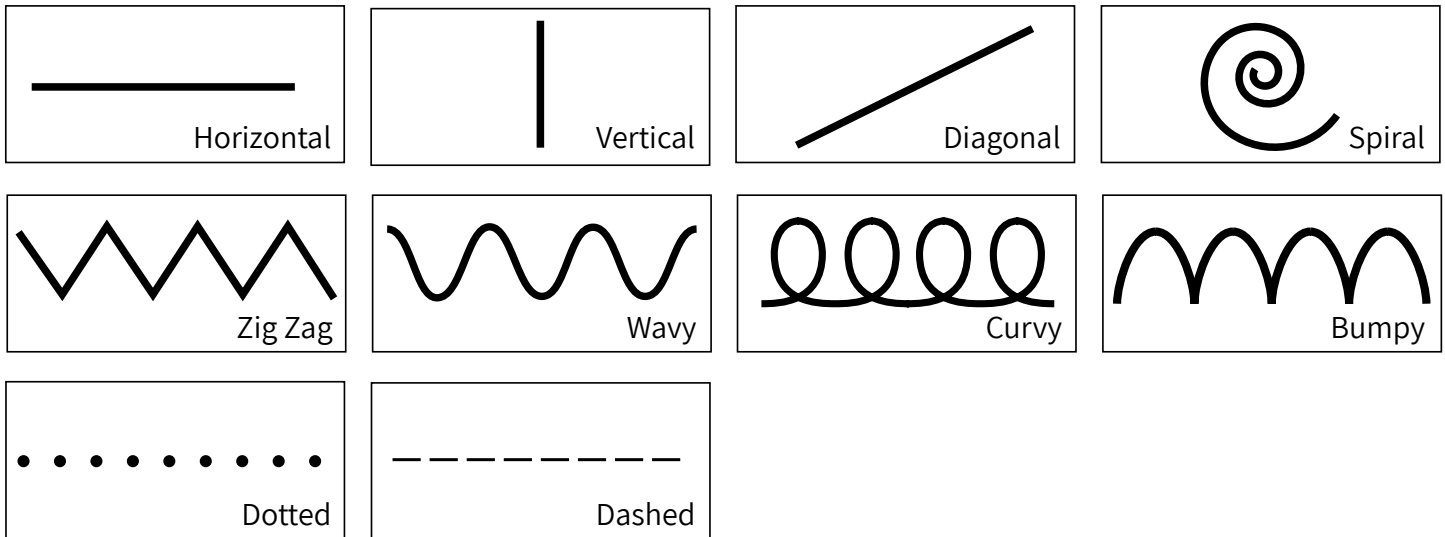


Element of Art: Line

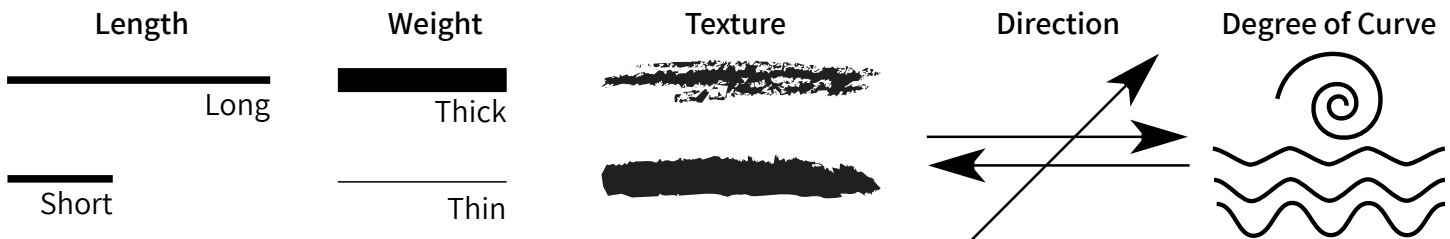
About Line

Some types of line:

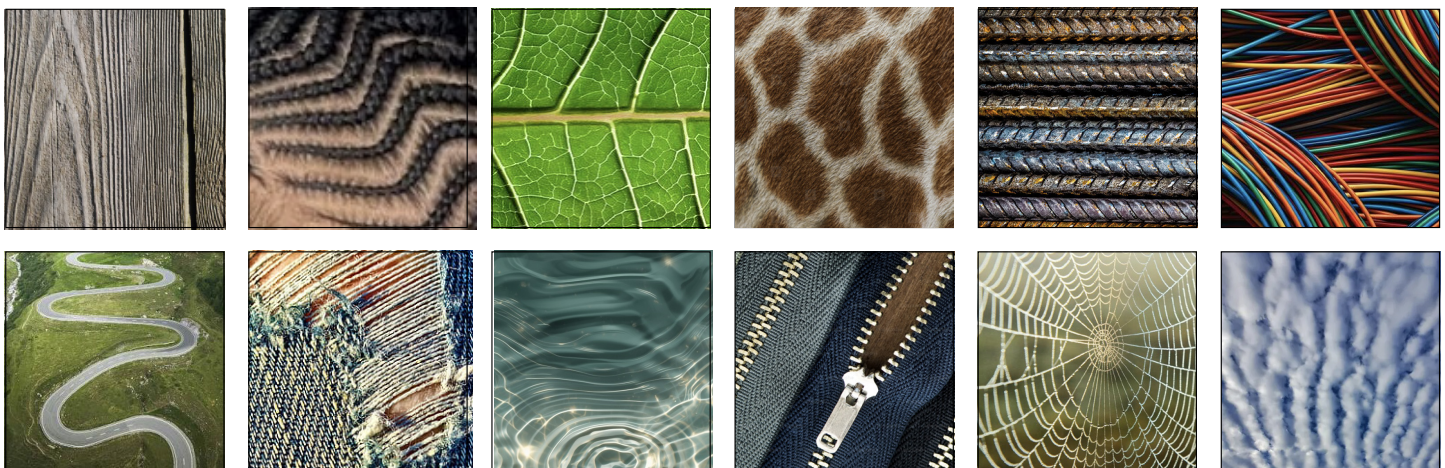

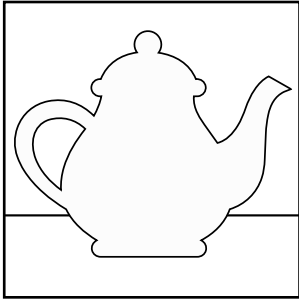

How do artists use line?

1. Defining Structure and Space



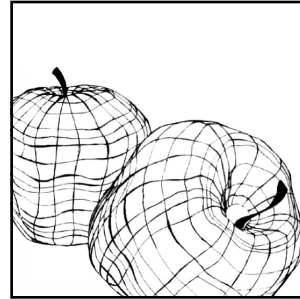
Outline

Marks the outer edge of a shape or object, separating it from the background or other shapes around it.



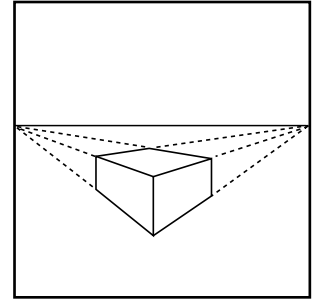
Contour Line

Defines the outer edge, boundaries, and significant interior surfaces of an object or figure without the use of shading.



Cross Contour Lines

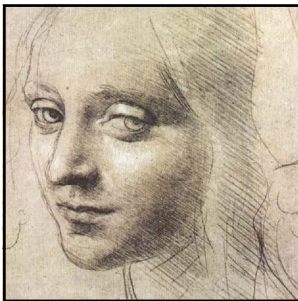
Lines that travel across the surface of an object to describe its three-dimensional volume, curves, and topography.



Linear Perspective

System that creates the illusion of depth and volume on a flat surface.

2. Adding value, texture and tone

Hatching

Lines applied in parallel direction to build up tone, texture, and form.



Portrait of Roulin, Vincent van Gogh

Cross Hatching

Lines are placed at an angle to one another to build up tone, texture, and form.

Line Weight

The relative thickness or darkness of a drawn line.

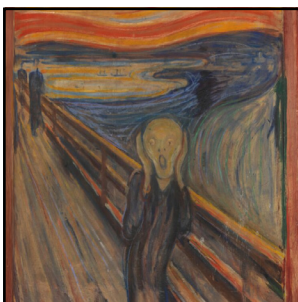


Self Portrait, Chuck Close

Scumbling

Layered, loose, and random lines—often described as controlled scribbling.

Leading Lines

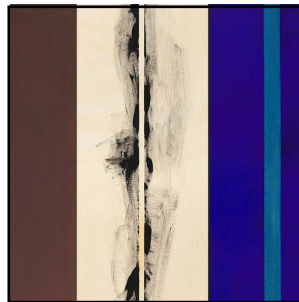
Physical or implied lines which steer the viewer's eye toward focal points in the picture plane.

Horizontal Lines

Suggest stability, calm, horizon, and rest.

Vertical Lines

Convey height, strength, spirituality, and formality.



Delicate Tension, Wassily Kandinsky

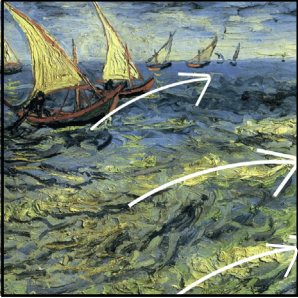
Diagonal & Zigzag Lines

Inject kinetic energy, tension, dynamism, and rapid visual pacing.

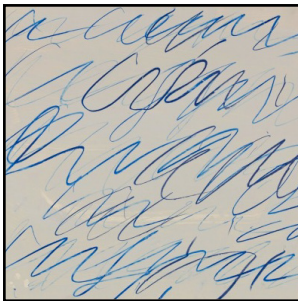


Fishing Boats at Sea

Implied Lines

An invisible path that the viewer's brain perceives as a line, even though no continuous, physical mark has been drawn.

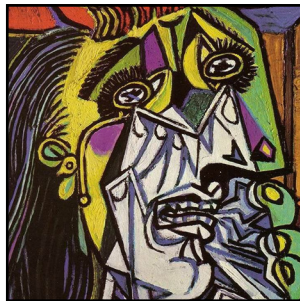
4. Expressing Emotion and Gesture

Expressive & Calligraphic Marks

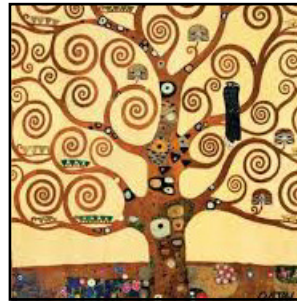
Fast, gestural, or sweeping strokes capture fleeting movement, rhythm, and raw energy.

Angular & Jagged Strokes

Create friction, anxiety, aggression, or unrest.

Smooth & Curvilinear Marks

Evoke gentleness, fluidity, organic growth, and elegance.
