Wayne Thiebaud

Wayne Thiebaud grew up in the depression and began his career as a cartoonist and commercial artist. Thiebaud began teaching, eventually taking an assistant professor at the University of California, Davis. His career as a painter grew and he became known for painting commonplace objects such as pies, toys, paint cans, ice cream cones, gumball machines, and hot dogs. Thiebaud's work is often associated with pop art as they both depict mass-produced consumer objects. Thieubaud acknowledged the overlap but says his work is not about criticizing consumer culture but he is simply concerned with the formal qualities of painting: color, line, shape, light, composition, and texture.

Questions:

- What element of art (line, shape, value, color, form, and texture) do you see as strongest in his work and, explain why.
- Can you find influences of his cartooning and commercial art experiences in his style of painting?
